



Thank you to all of our parents who responded to our RSHE Policy Parent Consultation Survey in May 2026.

We appreciate the policy is a long one to review and are grateful to those of you who gave your time to review it and respond to the survey.

This document summarises responses to the survey.

**The Survey**

As part of the survey, parents were asked to acknowledge agreement or disagreement with a number of statements.

Parents were provided with a copy of the draft 2026 RSHE policy, and a set of frequently-asked questions (FAQs), as well as images sharing the learning journey in PSHE across the school.

25 parents responded to the survey.

Parents were also given the chance to leave additional feedback regarding RSHE and PSHE at Burlington Junior School if they wished to do so.



One parent asked whether both boys and girls learn about male and female puberty.

- *Children are taught RSHE, including puberty and sex education, as part of their usual teaching group. This means that boys and girls will be in the classroom together.*
- *We have added this question and the response to our [‘frequently-asked questions’](#) document.*

One parent asked whether male and female teachers deliver the lessons to children, particularly with regards to menstruation.

- *Class teachers teach their own classes RSHE lessons throughout the year as part of PSHE. When teaching puberty (in boys and girls) and menstruation, we will endeavour to have both a male and female teacher present (with one of those being their class teacher). Due to staffing, this may not always be possible. Planning is reviewed by all members of the year team before being delivered to pupils.*
- *Some lessons in Year 5 and Year 6 (puberty and sex education) are delivered by nurses from the Kingston Schools Health Team.*
